was well received, and my thanks go to the HPV community for their support in making this such a success.



IPVS decided to host three post-conference **live educational webinars** covering topics of major interest (as identified in the feedback from delegates) in November and December. The webinars have been very well received, drawing hundreds of participants. We would like to thank our key-note speakers, panelists, and moderators for three excellent presentations. Another highlight of the year definitely worth mention is the historic **WHO launch** of the Global Strategy to Accelerate the Elimination of Cervical Cancer in November. It is genuinely exciting to be part of the global community mobilizing to make cervical cancer a disease of the past. There is much work ahead of us to get there. The role of IPVS in these efforts must be clear to our partners as we go forward.

Finally, a word about IPVS membership. Our society ends the year at all time high of **564 active IPVS members** in December. We expect to keep growing in the new year.

## International HPV Awareness Day - March 4th 2021

Preparations are well under way for the 4<sup>th</sup> annual HPV Awareness Campaign culminating on **International HPV Awareness Day (IHAD) on March 4<sup>th</sup>, 2021**. Last March, HPV was side-lined as public attention centered on another virus. We are not going to let that happen in 2021. Leveraging the current global environment of greater awareness about viruses and vaccines, the 2021 campaign will promote the fact that **HPV is a virus that we have the knowledge and tools to beat!** This is the inspiration behind the Campaign 2021 tag line

The 2021 awareness campaign will be about hope, inclusiveness, and collective action. The connection between HPV and cancer will be more explicit in our messaging but brought with optimism. We have the tools to beat HPV and a solid track record of progress. Additional effort has gone into tailoring videos for maximum impact at the regional level, so that more people realize that we are <u>all</u> affected by HPV. We anticipate that the <u>AskAboutHPV.org</u> website will be fully updated in early January. In the week of January 18<sup>th</sup>-21<sup>st</sup>, IPVS will host several **regional webinars** in French, Spanish, and English, to introduce the campaign theme and materials (posters, videos, leaflets, logos and more) to partners around the world. The campaign toolkit (available in 6 major languages) can be adapted and co-branded as necessary and used for local HPV awareness events and activities.

## **IPVS joins the European Cancer Organisation (ECO)**

We are pleased to announce that that IPVS will join the European Cancer Organisation as a member society, as was approved by the ECO Council in November. The longstanding cooperation between IPVS and the HPV Action Network (an ECO entity) will continue at a closer level as plans for eliminating HPV-cancers in Europe are implemented. This goal is achievable through evidence-based steps in four key areas: vaccination, screening, treatment, and public awareness. IPVS members will hear more about the specific priorities and focus of our collaboration with ECO in the new year.

## IPVS will host more educational webinars in 2021

The IPVS Education Committee is planning a series of webinars in 2021 at the global and regional level. These webinars will target scientists and health professionals that wish to keep abreast of advances in HPV basic and translational research leading to evidence-based developments in HPV prevention, screening and treatment.
