

IPVS Education

Make sure you don't miss our upcoming webinars and our new initiatives



For the first webinar of 2022, the Education Committee is pleased to invite you to join a live and free webinar on "HPV vaccine schedules and Sub-Saharan Africa" on 24th January. Sub Saharan Africa (SSA) has a very high burden of cervical cancer. HPV vaccines are being introduced in many countries in the region but there are many challenges in the implementation for the adolescent population. Two recent studies have recently reported at medical conferences (IPVC 34 Toronto) the interim results of trials with a 1 dose regimen of the bivalent vaccine Cervarix and the 9 valent vaccine Gardasil 9 to young girls and women.

In this webinar, the principal investigators of these trials, Drs Ruanne Barnabas, Nelly Mugo, and Deborah Watson Jones will present their results and discuss the implications with respect to vaccine implementation and effectiveness in the SSA setting. SSA also has a high incidence of HIV infection and a frequently asked question concerns the potential impact of HIV infection on HPV vaccine effectiveness in SSA and this will be discussed by Dr Helen Rees.
